This weekend we feature the third of our saints in the mosaic for the Shrine of the Good Shepherd – St. Maximilian Kolbe.

St. Maximilian Kolbe was born as Raymund Kolbe on January 8, 1894, in the Kingdom of Poland, part of the Russian Empire. He was a Polish Conventual Franciscan friar and a martyr in the German death Camp of Auschwitz during World War II. St. Maximilian Kolbe was very active in promoting the Immaculate Virgin Mary and is known as the Apostle of Consecration to Mary. Much of his life was strongly influenced by a vision he had of the Virgin Mary when he was 12. "That night I asked the Mother of God what was to become of me. Then she came to me holding two crowns, one white, the other red. She asked me if I was willing to accept either of these crowns. The white one meant that I should persevere in purity, and the red that I should become a martyr. I said that I would accept them both." One year after his vision, Kolbe and his elder brother, Francis joined the Conventual Franciscans. In 1910, Kolbe was given the religious name Maximilian, after being allowed to enter the novitiate, and in 1911, he professed his first vows. At the age of 21, Kolbe earned a doctorate in philosophy from the Pontifical Gregorian University. He would also earn a doctorate in theology by the time he was 28.

He founded a monthly periodical titled, "Rycerz Niepokalanej" (Knight of the Immaculate). He also operated a religious publishing press and founded a new Conventual Franciscan monastery at Niepokalanej, which became a major religious publishing center after founding monasteries in both Japan and India. To this day, the monastery in Japan remains prominent in the Roman Catholic Church in Japan.

In 1936, Kolbe's poor health forced him to return home to Poland, and once the WWII invasion by Germany began, he became one of the only brothers to remain in the monastery. He opened up a temporary hospital to aid those in need. When his town was captured, Kolbe was sent to prison but released three months later. Kolbe refused to sign a document that would recognize him as a German citizen with his German ancestry and continued to work in his monastery, providing shelter for refugees - including hiding 2,000 Jews from German persecution. After receiving permission to continue his religious publishing, Kolbe's monastery acted as a publishing house again and issued many anti-Nazi German publications.

On February 17, 1941, the monastery was shut down; Kolbe was arrested by the German Gestapo and taken to the Pawiak prison. Three months later, he was transferred to Auschwitz. Never abandoning his priesthood, Kolbe was the victim of severe violence and harassment. Toward the end of his second month in Auschwitz, men were chosen to face death by starvation to warn against escapes. Kolbe was not chosen but volunteered to take the place of a man with a family. It is said during the last days of his life Kolbe led prayers to Our Lady with the prisoners and remained calm. He was the last of the group to remain alive, after two weeks of dehydration and starvation. The guards gave him a lethal injection of carbolic acid. The stories tell that he raised his left arm and calmly awaited death. St. Maximilian Kolbe died on August 14 and his remains were cremated on August 15, the same day as the Assumption of Mary's feast day. Recognized as the Servant of God, Kolbe was beatified as a "Confessor of the Faith" on October 17, 1971 by Pope Paul VI and canonized by Pope John Paul II on October 10, 1982. Pope John Paul II declared Kolbe not a confessor, but a martyr.

Kolbe's is often depicted in a prison uniform and with a needle being injected into an arm. He is the patron saint of drug addicts, prisoners, families, and the pro-life movement and his feast day is celebrated on August 14.

Stewardship

One of the ways our parishioners share in our stewardship efforts in the broader community is by serving at the **Morristown Community Soup Kitchen and Outreach Center**. In addition to helping their guests access community services, **the Soup Kitchen** provides nutritious meals free of charge, no questions asked, to anyone who comes seeking nourishment. They serve from 150 to 300 guests each day.

The St. Vincent Martyr team serves a warm lunch at the Soup Kitchen on the second Thursday of each month. Right now we have about 20 active volunteers, which include 9 who are trained for kitchen work, assisting in preparing the food onsite before it is served. Our volunteers come from all walks of life: single people, mothers with children and senior citizens.

The Soup Kitchen ministry received seven new volunteers as a result of our stewardship efforts, two of whom have already begun serving. The number of active volunteers means that if some volunteers are unable to serve on a given date, there are still always enough to complete the service. 

XVII Domingo del Tiempo
Ordinario

Primera Lectura: 1 Reyes 3, 5. 7-12

Hoy el Señor te enfrenta a un reto. Tienes una encomienda que realizar y puedes intentarlo solo o reconocer la necesidad de acudir por ayuda. Decides que es más importante: tus logros personales o el cumplimiento de la tarea, pensando en el bienestar de los demás.

Segunda Lectura: Rom 8, 28-30

En esta lectura san Pablo nos dice que Dios cumple siempre su promesa. Todos hemos sido llamados, pero unos responden de una manera y otros de otra ¿Cómo has respondido tu a ese llamado? ¿Dónde está Cristo en esa respuesta tuya?

Evangelio: San Mateo 13, 44-55

San Mateo nos trae nuevamente otra parábola sobre el reino de los cielos. Si verdaderamente crees y amas al Señor no tendrás reparo en desprenderte de lo que sea necesario para tener y gozar de ese reino que te ofrece Cristo. El mensaje es un aliciente para los que viven conforme a las enseñanzas del Evangelio y una invitación a la conversión para los que están de espaldas al Señor.

¿Qué son las parábolas?

Durante tres domingos Jesús nuestro Señor estará hablándonos en Parábolas. Las parábolas son relatos, historias escuetas, claras, sencillas, y su finalidad es transmitir una enseñanza del modo más comprensible y fácil de recordar.

En todas destaca la pequeñez de los comienzos; y el crecimiento progresivo de este Reino; su fuerza regeneradora para los llamados por Dios a la salvación,

que alcanzarán si corresponden a esa vocación.

Jesús predica utilizando parábolas, es decir, ejemplos vivos, imágenes tomadas de la vida ordinaria, dándoles contenidos ricos y amplios. Después un año de recorrer los caminos de Palestina, predicando el Evangelio del Reino y confirmando su doctrina con innumerables milagros. Muchos creen, otros no. Jesús habla del Reino de Dios con tacto y utiliza parábolas en las que, sin ocultar que está diciendo cosas nuevas incita a los oyentes a interesarse y les advierte: "¡quién tenga oídos para oír, que oiga". Entenderán los que tengan un corazón dispuesto a la conversión a Dios con el rechazo del pecado, también en sus formas más sutiles.
